HANNAH GOULD DAY CELEBRATES HER 102ND BIRTHDAY

Manchester, N.H. Paper Prints Interesting Article About a Member of the Gould Family, an Aunt of Frank C. Gould and Mrs. Gould Leete. A Long Lived Fami

Below is printed a special to the Manchester, N.H. Daily Union in regard to Mrs. Hannah Gould Day, who is related to Mrs. Gould Leete, a niece, and Frank C. Gould, a nephew.

She comes of a long lived family. Her father, William Gould, lived to be 92. F. C. Gould's father died while en route from East Hartford to Warren, N.H.. He had been visiting his son there. He was 88 years and five months old at the time of his death. Mrs. Day's sister lived to be 97 and Mary Gould Talbot, another sister, lived to be 92, and a brother, James, attained the age of 99. But Mrs. Day out-lived them all.

The Union's article follows: Special to the Union:

PIKE, Oct. 16 - Cosily seated in her own little corner back of the big stove in the cheery living room of the house that has been her home for many years, warm ly wrapped in her little gray jacket, and with a close fitting blue cap on her head, safely sheltered from chilly drafts or the too hot glare of the sun's rays the little woman who will be 102 years old next Monday sat to have her picture taken. It is in this corner that Mrs. Day spends most of her time.

Hannah Gould was born in Cape Breton Isle October 15, 1826, the daughter of \mathbb{N}^r . and \mathbb{N}^r s. William Gould. She was one of 16 childrenof whom she is the sole survivor.

When Hannah was 6 years old her parents came to the States, making the journey by water and landing at Boston. Not long did they tarry there but moved on to "Old Haverhill", Mass., and after a brief stay there, set out for Haverhill, N.H., making the entire journey on foot. The baby was carried in a two wheel cart, the other members of the family walking until little feet refused to go any further. Then each child, in turn, was placed in the cart and baby was borne in the arms of mother or father. By walking night and day, resting only when and as long as was absolutely necessary, the long miles were covered in six days. In telling of that long ago, memorable trip, Mrs. Day says "We fared hard." Great was their joy when they reached what is now Pike, but was then known as East Haverhill, and came to est in the home of Uncle Phineas Gould, the house now owned and occupied by Kenneth Pike and family.

Built Several Houses

The first home of the Gould family was built a little to the west of the Brushwood road. Mr. Gould, who was a carpenter, was the builder of many a house hat is still standing in Pike, among them being the Sherwell houses, both of the were associated with early days of whetstone manufacture in Pike. Indeed, some of the older residents of Pike claim that the first whetstones ground in Pike were ground by Mrs. Gould and her daughters.

At the age of 23 Hannah Gould was married to Daniel W. Day, who was born at Parsonfield, Maine, in 1825, and who, at the age of 7, came here with his paren making the journey in a 4-ox cart, carrying the whole family, as well as the household goods. To Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Day, six children were born: Zelendor, Emma, Isaiha, Simon, Joseph and Peabody. Of these, three are still living::Zelendor, (Mrs. Robert Bagley of Boston), Joseph Day of Haverhill and Peabody of Pike. Ezekiel Day died in 1889.

Although she left Cape Breton at so early an age, Mrs. Day can recall her father's returning from a hunting and fishing trip accompanied by several Indians the spent more than one night sleeping on the floor about the fireplace.

when she was a small girl she would care for the snares, often supplementing the family larder with an offering of from 15 to 20 rabbits at a time. And she tells of one instance when she brought home a big catch of trout. When questioned as to how she caught them she confessed that she was guilty of "liming." She had heard that liming, although not permissible, was one sure way of becoming a successful fisherman, so she went to the foot of Black Mountain where her father was at work, got some lime and threw it in the brook. The trout were eaten, but Hannah was not permitted to repeat the performance.

Mrs. Day has always been, and still is, an ardent lover of flowers, but can no longer care for them, although she does get out among them occasionally. Asters, iris and the old fashioned hollyhocks are her favorites, but in late years only the perennials bear mute but glowing testimony to her planting and care. Mrs. Day's hearing has yielded to the advance of years and her eyesight is almost gone. She is bent and wrinkled but her general health is good.

For many years she has made her home with her youngest son, Peabody, in a litt one story brick building with a stone floored "ell" kitchen. The house is situated on the old turnpike, which is the direct road from Haverhill to Plymouth There Ers. Day has lived for nearly three quarters of a century.

Four years ago, at the age of 59, Peabody Day was stricken with infantile paralysis which left the entire lower part of his body helpless. However, Mr. Day had heavy steel braces made to fit from waist to feet and with these, and the aid of heavy rope looped in the doorways he can swing himself anywhere about the house

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Moore and family have taken residence at the Day home now and between them all Mrs. Day receives the best of care.

Hannah Gould Day was the great great aunt of Earle Frank Alfred Gould of East Hartford, Conn. Hannah Day died October 17, 1929. Daniel W. Day died September22, 1914. - Both are buried in the Ladd Street Cemetery. Uncle Phineas Gould is buried in the cemetery on Rt. 25 in Pike, N.H. with his wife Mary Jones Gould He died May 14, 1851.
