State of New Hampshire

On this thirty first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighteen and of the independence of the United States the forty second before me William H Woodworth Chief Justice of the Courts of Common Pleas for the second circuit in said State comprising the county of Grafton came James Goode of Hanson in said county a citizen of the United States and being duly sworn under solemn oath that the declaration hereunto annexed by him subscribed is just and true. The declaration aforesaid being made in order to obtain the provisions made in and by an act of the Congress of the United States approved on the eighteenth day of March current. The said James Goode declaring that he has now in ^{his} power to show evidence of his said oaths.

I do therefore hereby certify that it appears to my satisfaction that the said James Goode is as an Officer on the Continental establishment in the Army of the Revolution against the common enemy for a longer term than three months at one place or of also from my personal knowledge that the said James Goode is of his own free will and of his own personal knowledge and is not a deserter from the Army of the Revolution and I do accordingly transmit the declaration aforesaid to the Secretary of War at the Department as the law requires.

James Gold of Hanover in the county of Guilford
and State of New Hampshire on oath declare that I was
commissioned and served as a Lieutenant in the Con-
tinental Army of the Revolutionary War - that I belonged
to the line of New Hampshire troops to the Regiment
commanded by Colonel Cidley, and to the Company
commanded by Capt. John House - that I entered
the Army on the Continental Establishment bearing
been commissioned as aforesaid in the month of
June 1776 at the White Plains - that I served as
aforesaid until the 14th day of September 1777 when
I was wounded by a shot through the body - that after
lying in the hospital at Albany, ^{more or less from} I had leave to return
home and to remain there until called for - that I have
never been called for - that I have never received any
other discharge from the Army - and that I have by some
means unknown to me lost my aforesaid Commission
out of my possession.

I further ~~swear~~ declare that on account of my wound as
aforesaid I have received since Dec. 14th 1786 a pension
of four pounds per month - that the instrument above
annexed is the original certificate by which I have received
said pension - that I am destitute of property - and that my
pension aforesaid is the only means of support which I
possess.

I therefore resign my claim to the pension above mentioned
according to the Law of the United States. James Gold
