



He died about 7 P.M. on the evening of the 29th of March. I was at his house all day with my wife and son & we were at the funeral service in the church in the evening. He had been making a speech in favor of the "Ministers' State" - I think it was the first time he had done so in public. He was speaking with great energy & in full voice but his voice was very weak & his speech was cut short by the sudden occurrence of a violent nervous disease which caused him to drop down on the floor. He died without regaining consciousness. He was buried in the cemetery at 12 o'clock at noon on the 30th of March. I think he died at the beginning of the afternoon & was buried at the end of the afternoon. His body was washed & dressed & laid out in the room where he had been receiving visitors - the room was filled with flowers & the floor was covered with a carpet. He was buried in a grave near the main entrance to the cemetery. The minister who performed the service was Rev. Dr. John W. Jones of Philadelphia. He said he was informed that Dr. Jones had been sent to the cemetery by Dr. James G. Jones of New York.
